- Note 1 Activities described 'per year' means each year starting on the anniversary of your renewal
- Note 2 Informal Mentoring is not part of a formal training programme but means where a coach is learning by receiving advice or help from a more senior, or more experienced coach. The mentor should be listed as a referee and the relationship is expected to extend over at least 4 months.
- Note 3 The period of working with sports specialists should cover at least two events of 2 hours such as a squad session or a similar event.

 A sports specialist is defined as a person degree qualified in a sports science and a sports professional as a qualified full time employee
 - Note 4 The work with a more senior coach shall comprise working at a 'structured' event such as performance workshop or squad or programmed performance coaching
 - Note 5 A small amount of CPD, that is not specific to Archery Coaching, may be claimed. For example items 021 & 022 (First Aid) could have been obtained at work. In less obvious cases the applicant should explain their relevance as Archery Coaching CPD.
 - **Note 6** A Published Paper should be a substantial and original work, made generally available, of at least 2000 words, possibly supported by a PowerPoint presentation, which outlines a basic concept or problem, discusses it and leads the reader to a specific conclusion from which they can learn.
 - Note 7 Workshop sessions contained within the programmes of Conferences or Seminars do NOT attract CPD points in addition to the points allowed for the whole event.

General Note Working with a Junior archer toward the attainment of GCSE or Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme with archery can qualify for CPD points. The individual level of involvement should be discussed with Renewals Panel and will require verification from a teacher or DofE administrator.
